From the Super's Desk

Craftsmanship

Watching me work on our layout, a member of our club asked: why was I taking so much care with a project that would eventually be hidden under scenery? My reply: I was afraid that if I let down in one area, it would be reflected in my

work on areas that do show.

Is this craftsmanship? Not really. We can define true craftsmanship as setting a goal and knowing how to achieve it. Probably the honest answer should have been: "I'm not sure where I'm going here."

Look at the back of any piece of case furniture such as a chest of drawers. No matter how fancy and high style the front and sides, the back is finished to a bare minimum, enough to hold everything together, but no carvings, sanding, or varnish. Craftsmanship goes into the parts that count.

Of course the basement is completely utilitarian unless a model railroader lives in the house.

Allen McClelland has been credited with introducing the idea of "good enough" to model railroading. I'll bet some people thought or chose to think that this represents some kind of celebration of the mediocre, a turning away from the idea of quality in all things. Instead he recognized that planning, building, and running a layout requires so many tasks that the perfect layout will always elude us if we build everything to the same attention to detail and finish.

Doing more than running trains in circles has become integral to our hobby. Researching prototype construction and building models of railroad, residential, and industrial buildings has become an important component of our hobby – similarly, locomotives and rolling stock, and perhaps road vehicles. Learning and implementing prototype-based operating schemes has taken off since primordial efforts decades ago.

And yet, we cannot do all things to the same level or equally to an advanced level, at least not if we are typical humans.

The real craftsman distinguishes what must be done from what is a waste of time and resources. Declaring "discretion is the better part of valor," Shakespeare's Falstaff picked his battles wisely, for his goal was to live another day. I pick my projects carefully so that I have a reasonably detailed, well-running layout that offers opportunities for interesting operations and allows me to display and run scratch-built and kit-built rolling stock. Oh, if I ever do scratch build that locomotive – let's name it the "Chippendale" – I will have a place to put it through its paces.

Bring'n'Brag

September's Bring 'n' Brag contest was held during the regular monthly meeting at The Zion Lutheran Church in Greensburg, PA. The contest model theme this month was the Lumber and Logging Industry, and three entries were submitted.

Mike Hohn won First Place for his HO scale Logging Camp Model. Mike's model received 11 of the 26 votes cast. His model was built from a craftsman kit, which he had purchased sometime around the eighth grade. He must have used the right kind of glue since it looked like it had just recently been assembled.

Marge Meehan's models won Second Place after receiving 9 votes. Her models were of Cache Creek On30 disconnected logging cars, which she built from resin kits. She also included logs made from sticks cut from trees and shrubs out of her yard.

Bob DiBenedetto's HO scale Chessie System wood chip hoppers took Third Place, with 6 votes. He started with three Athearn Ready to Roll 40' wood chip hoppers which he weathered with paint and chaulks and replaced the couplers with Kadee's.


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MAP TO THE NOVEMBER 16, 2014 MEETING


