Minutes

January 16, 2022 Business Meeting

Superintendent Frank Benders opened the virtual (Zoom) January general division meeting at 2:32 PM. He thanked Dennis Coglianese for hosting the meeting via Zoom. This was a lastminute decision because of the spiking Omicron variant numbers. Frank remarked that the weather forecast would have probably impacted physical attendance. As it was, there were about 20 meeting attendees.

Pass the Hat: Frank asked that this month's contribution be added to your February donation.

New members and / or guests: There were no new members or guests.

Andy Blenko moved and Patrick Altdorfer seconded a motion to accept last month's meeting minutes as published in the November Keystone Flyer. The motion passed unanimously by acclima-

Committee Reports:

Flyer: Patrick Altdorfer reported that the *Flyer* went out last week. He wants to start a new feature showing off members' layout work. He wants to focus on layouts that will be on the tour for Jamboree weekend. Bob Prehoda was the first volunteer. Everyone who renewed their Pike ads was contacted and asked to supply information: layout concept, theme, design, problems in construction. It doesn't matter if your layout is 100% scenicked or not. Bob's is. There are a number of well-built layouts that are not 100% sceniced, e.g., the Blenko's. He's looking for ideas that will help motivate people to work on their own layouts. The February issue will feature Bob Prehoda's layout which will be open for the Jamboree layout tour. Patrick is looking for another layout to feature as well, so there is space. He would like to feature these layouts on tour in the March and April issues. Andy Blenko volunteered to have his layout in the March edition. Patrick noted that Bob's layout information was awaiting some editing work and that Bob would receive a proof. He offered to send Andy a copy of that proof so that he could see what Bob supplied. Patrick also suggested that Andy could try submitting his layout information for February if he wished. He concluded by reminding everyone that the deadline for the next Flyer is January 23, although a few days later would be accepted.

Treasurer: Jeff Gregg was not present, but did give his report to Frank. He reported that the division is solvent.

Programs: that next month at the DARE Model Railroad Club, the program will be on the history of the Montour Railroad. The club seems to be a museum of the line. Keith DeVault has volunteered the Morgantown club location for the March meeting; the program is still TBD. The Morgantown, WV club is located at their new facility located in Mountaineer Mall & Professional Plaza, 5000 Green Bag Road, Morgantown, 26501. April is the Jamboree. Andy is still looking for May and June venues. Neal Schorr suggested that the division try to reschedule the Ohio Valley Lines (Ambridge) into one of those slots. Division 2 dominated the show with their large number of modules. Patrick indicated that David Brown wants to bring his large (11' x 11') corner module; we may have to ask for more space. David has been involved with Free-Mo for a while and we want to encourage his and others' participation.

Bring-N-Brag: Neither Tracy Boyd nor Richard Terek were present and as the January contest was deferred to the February meeting, there was no report.

Video Library: Bud Brock was not present so no report.

Achievement Program: Dennis Vaccaro was not present but submitted his report to Frank. Frank announced that Susan Werner had received the following certificates: Engineering – Civil, Engineering – Electrical, Scenery, as well as Merit Award for Trackwork and Scenery. Dennis also submitted 3 certificate applications, 2 merit award applications, and a Golden Spike application to Region.

T-Trak: Richie Jodon was not present so the report was made by Jimmy Braum. There is still no update from CMR from their modules. He's heard good things about Masterpiece Models. Jeff Gregg sent in the T-Trak application for the February Greenberg Show. T-Trak will be sharing space with the NMRA recruitment table. The T-Trak module is scheduled for the Mid-Mon Valley Railroad Club's show in New Eagle; participants are being sought. That show will be 10-4 on Sunday, January 30 with set up on the previous Saturday night. The address is 157 Chess Street, New Eagle, PA.

Jamboree: Grier Kuehn reported that the Jamboree is on schedule, mostly as result of the efforts of Neal Schorr, Jim Sacco, and himself. Grier especially thanked Tom Gaus for functioning as registrar as well as updating the jamboree pages on the website as quickly as new information became available. Grier indicated that there will be 4 prototype clinics as well as 8 modeling clinics scheduled. A lunch program has also been planned, but specifics are yet to be determined. Grier also thanked Andy Blenko for taking charge of the donation solicitation effort. Andy has been in contact with national distributors, on-line companies, and manufacturers. Right now we have over \$2,400 in model railroad donations. Rob Twigger and Grier will be soliciting on the Sunday of the Greenberg Show for one last time. Grier noted that the COVID-19 virus had done a number on the division; the low active membership number remains a concern. He believes that the Jamboree is a great way to recruit and encourages fellow members and non-members to attend. He will put something to this effect in the Flyer. The potential for a poorly attended Jamboree remains a concern and if that occurs could impact the Jamboree's bottom line. Frank indicated that David Neff, MCR president, is planning to attend. Grier hopes he will bring a few people with him. Event notices have appeared in *NMRA Magazine* and will appear for the next 2 months. The event has also been publicized in *Model Railroad News*. He was unsuccessful getting the Jamboree notice into Model Railroader.

If you have anything you want to donate (new, unused), please bring it to the next meeting(s) or to the Jamboree itself. Grier reported that he and Andy had discussed non-rail items for the raffle. As reported previously, Grier has a personally autographed T.J. Watt Steeler's helmet. Andy is struggling as to how to attract other non-rail items. George Pandelios suggested selling the helmet on eBay so as to bring in the maximum amount of money and reach non-model railroaders. If you know someone who wants to donate something like this, please let him know. In the past, Marge Meehan assisted in this, but is unable to help.

Susan reported that a new division member is at the Locomotion Days exhibit at the Carnegie Science Center and took a number of Jamboree flyers with him to distribute. Grier indicated that he has a surplus of color flyers – contact him and he will mail them to you. Neal reported that he has been trying to work with neighboring divisions to boost attendance. He has been speaking to Division 12 in Erie and would like to speak with Division 1 (Youngstown) but doesn't have a contact there. He asked if anyone had a contact name or e-mail for Division 1; Frank provided an e-mail address. Neal has offered to conduct a clinic for Division 12 in return for their enhanced promotion of the Jamboree. He has also been promoting the event to his 3-rail friends.

Finally, Grier noted that Janet DeVault prefers members fill-in the White Elephant form on the website. He asked Tom Gaus how Janet might receive that information. A discussion on the merits and availability of a printer and Wi-Fi at the Jamboree ensued. Eventually it was determined that each member bringing items for the White Elephant sale should print a copy of the form for themselves and for Janet.

MCR 2023 Convention: Keith DeVault reported that cards and information will be available at the Greenberg Show in February.

Old Business: Frank asked Susan to report on nomination. She began by thanking Don Coulter and Arley Mitchell for assisting her. Susan reported the nominees as follows: Dennis Coglianese for Superintendent; George Pandelios for Assistant Superintendent; Mike DiSensi for Chief Clerk. Frank then asked for nominations from the floor. There were none. Susan reminded George and Dennis to submit short biographies for the Keystone Flyer. Patrick offered to send all nominees an e-mail solicitation for biographies. Susan accepted his offer.

Grier asked if because there were no competing candidates for the 3 division posts if it was necessary to send out ballots. He noted that it would be a waste of money and that a vote by acclimation would be most efficient and cost-effective. Susan noted that write-in votes were possible, but probably not practical. 
For the Good of the Division

February 20: DARE Club, Venetia



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THE KEYSTONE DIVISION LAYOUT LANDSCAPE

CONSIDERATIONS WHEN DESIGNING A MODEL RAILROAD

The Huntingdon Northern Railway by Bob Prehoda

The Concept:

After reading numerous articles in *Model Railroader* magazine in the 1980s, written by my favorite authors Allen McClelland and Tony Koester, I decided that I wanted to build a free-lanced, coal-hauling railroad set in Southwestern Pennsylvania. It was to be a bridge route between Pittsburgh and Cumberland, MD and serve various industries, mines, and interchanges along the mainline. It would also be a mountain railroad, requiring helpers to push the tonnage over the Alleghenies, similar to Allen's Virginian & Ohio and Tony's Allegheny Midland!

Originally, the era was set in 1964, but I have gradually backdated to 1957, as I began to acquire more reliable and smooth running steam locomotives. Most of the engines and half the cars have been relettered to represent the Huntingdon Northern Railway.

After making many sketches to determine what shape would fit into my 24'×26' basement, I chose a design that used the main entry aisle to serve multiple purposes. It had to give me access to the stairs, garage, and especially the laundry room, because the furnace, water heater, refrigerator, and laundry facilities were there. It would also serve as an operating aisle for a major yard that was planned there. I determined that a width of 3 feet would be sufficient.

I also wanted a walk-around design that allowed my future crews and me to follow their trains and perform switching tasks. As mentioned above, my hobby heroes were Allen McClelland with his Virginian & Ohio and Tony Koester's Allegheny Midland. I used (copied) some of





their designs on my Huntingdon Northern. Although the railroad would be operated point to point, I also wanted to have a continuous loop for display running during open houses, breaking in locomotives, and for track cleaning purposes.



The Huntingdon Northern Railway is a bridge route that handles a lot of the coal traffic between the PRR and B&O, as well as between the mines and prep plants of the region. *Left*: Hoppers at Friendship Mine in Coal Valley are waiting for the Laurel Turn to return and finish switching the mtys and pulling the loads. *Above*: Loaded hoppers at Crescent Mine in Port Allegheny are ready for pickup by the Lauren Turn. *Below*: Besides coal, the HN also handles a decent amount of mixed freight traffic to the small towns along the right-of-way; here a boxcar is spotted at the team track at Meadow Run, waiting to be retrieved by the Meadow Run Local.

Track Design:

Since this wasn't my first rodeo, being thrifty (poor), I started reusing the track that I used on previous model railroads, which was Atlas code 100 brass flexible track. However, I purchased and used Atlas code 100 nickel silver flexible track on all mainline and passing sidings. The Atlas brass was used on industrial spurs, yards, and engine servicing facilities.

Another consideration about track planning was to determine the minimum radius that would be used.



The minimum radius was set at 24", but I used easement templates to disguise the sharpness of the curves. The added benefit was that I could fit (cram) more peninsulas and aisle ways in my moderate space.

Although not originally included in the initial track design, I would be remiss in not mentioning the importance of including a branch line to enhance railroad operations, even if it's rather short like mine. I was able to lengthen one of my peninsulas over an existing wet bar that was used as part of a crew lounge. The peninsula had to be narrowed down to about 4' in width. The backdrop was extended down the middle and by having the branch line split and go through the backdrop to the other side, I was able to have two more towns with their coal mines on different sides of the same backdrop!! The opening through the backdrop was disguised with a canopy of trees.

Esthetics:

Not only did I want a model railroad to operate in a prototypical manner, but I wanted it to be pleasing to gaze upon. To get the free-flowing, walk-around design that I wanted, it required using L-girder construction for the


benchwork. This would also allow scenery to be above and below the roadbed. I used 1/2" plywood for the sub-roadbed with another layer of 1/2" homasote on top of that. On all visible trackage, the homasote was cut in 4' or 8' lengths with a width that matched the width of the track ties, except in yard areas. I used a papier mache material to form the shoulders of the roadbed that would eventually form the ballast profile. All classification tracks in the yards were sloped downward with a slight grade. Not only did this avoid the completely flat look, but it allowed me to pull long strings of cars out of my classification tracks without uncoupling over the track magnets.

Also, I tried to use gentle curves on much of the visible trackage, even through many of the smaller towns. I do have straight track, but I avoided running it parallel to the edge of the layout. Before ballasting the track, I spray painted the rails; but please use a respirator while doing it!!

Using backdrops down the middle of peninsulas helps to make my layout seem larger than it really is. This makes it difficult to see the whole railroad at once, and forces visitors/crews to view more scenes as they follow the aisle ways around the layout.

Hopefully, this might give you something to think about as you design your own model railroad. The Huntingdon Northern will be open for visitation (inspection) as part of this year's Jamboree in April.







THE KEYSTONE DIVISION LAYOUT LANDSCAPE

This feature is the first in a series of articles that focus on the layouts our members have built, either for display or for prototype operation, at their homes. Many readers have seen the pike ads over the years but may not yet have visited these layouts. Some of these layouts are completed (essentially, is a model railroad ever really "done"?), while others are in varied states of completion, from "benchwork plus" to "50% scenicked" to "almost there" — whatever, it does not matter, since many of our readers want to build a layout at home and would love to hear about the experiences — both positive and negative — of those who have already made significant progress on a home layout.

With any luck, those of you who are hosting an open house on April 24 after the Jamboree to present your layouts will step up and submit something for me to showcase in this space in the March and April issues; this will give members and Jamboree attendees an opportunity to preview the layouts they may be able to see that weekend. Layouts that are not open after the Jamboree can be covered in later issues this year, as they will hopefully also be open to us, either after meetings that we hold nearby, or at future jamboree or convention hosted by Division Two.

Think of this article as a shorter version of the layout features you see in the monthly model railroad press. The article need not be long; Bob's text covered just 1.5 typed pages. Your contribution should cover the following topics, at a minimum:

- Theme (proto vs. freelance, urban vs. rural, industries on the line, etc.); Era; and Scale;
- Room considerations, layout dimensions, track grades and radii; and
- Techniques used for benchwork, subroadbed, scenery.

As you can see from Bob's contribution, pictures complement the text and effectively illustrate key points you make about your layout. Do not fret about your prose: I will edit for spelling, grammar, style, etc. to ensure your points come across well, and I will touch base with you before we go to press if there is anything that is unclear.

Finally, it is worth mentioning that a contribution like this may be used to earn points toward your <u>Model Railroad Author</u> AP certificate; for details about this, you should contact AP Chair Dennis Vaccaro (724-929-2190, or vaccaro_dennis@yahoo.com).
